

Investment Comment

- · Equity markets continued their rally during September, rising for the seventh month in a row. Markets were supported by expectations of a positive earnings results season during October, generally better economic news and continued hopes that interest rates would not rise materially during 2010. Some market participants, who have remained in cash so far during the rally, are now being forced into the markets. Although the longer-term outlook for equities remains reasonably positive, it is possible that we will see some retracement in coming months. Markets appear overbought, while equity valuations are not as attractive as they have been.
- World equities (in euro terms) rose by 2.5% in September, leaving the total return for the first nine months of 2009 at over 22%. Since 9th March, when markets reached their low point, world equities have rallied by almost 47%. Most of the main markets were up in September, ranging from 8% in Ireland to 3.5% in Europe. The notable exception was Japan, which fell by almost 6%, where a stronger yen and expectations of capital raising hurt exporters and financials respectively. After a period marked by profit-taking, the Chinese market began to rebound during the month.
- The significant reductions in global interest rates, in an attempt to reflate economic growth, now appear to be at an end with US, UK and eurozone short rates currently at 0.25%, 0.5% and 1.0% respectively. Fears of an early rise in rates have subsided in recent months, as the authorities have espoused a lowerfor-longer agenda. Further out, however, rates will rise from these emergency low levels. The futures markets are currently factoring in eurozone rates of 1.75% to 2% by the end of 2010. Elsewhere, following a significant rally since the beginning of the year, the oil price treaded water for the second month in a row during September, finishing the period at \$69 per barrel. The gold price surged ahead by almost 6%, ending the month at \$1,008 per troy ounce, close to an all-time high. Gold is seen by many investors as a hedge against either inflation or a weak US dollar.
- Sectorwise, the dominant story during the month was the outperformance of cyclical stocks, such as industrials and basic materials, over defensive areas. Financial stocks, which had been the driving force of the rally since the spring, suffered slightly from profit-taking and underperformed the market during September.
- Corporate earnings' news was relatively subdued ahead of the third-quarter reporting season, which begins in earnest in the second week of October. Sentiment regarding Q3 profits has been positive following better-thanexpected results for the first two quarters. Companies are likely to remain

- upbeat concerning the outlook for profits for the rest of 2009 and into 2010. On the M&A front, Dell announced a €3.9bn takeover of Perot Systems.
- The US dollar and sterling both weakened against the euro during September, with the €/\$ rate ending the period at 1.46. The euro's strength is mainly due to relative interest rate expectations.

Eagle Star Funds - Asset Allocation

The funds are neutral to overweight in equities and overweight in bonds.

Equities

Countries & Markets: Overweight & Underweight positions

The fund managers increased the equity position from slightly overweight to overweight during the period, in advance of the Q3 earnings season. The main regional changes were an increase from neutral to overweight in the Pacific Basin, following a correction in the Chinese markets, a further increase in the European position and a reduction in the Japanese weighting. The funds' main positions at the end of September were significantly overweight in Europe, overweight in the Pacific Basin, close to neutral in the UK and underweight in the US, Japan and

Sectors: Overweight & Underweight positions

The only significant change in sectoral positions during the month was a further increase in financial stocks, with purchases in Europe, Australia and Hong Kong. Overall, the funds' main positions at the end of September were overweight in technology stocks and financials. Other sectoral positions were pretty balanced.

Eurozone bonds had another good month during September, adding to the positive performance of the previous three months. As in August, bond market gains came at the same time as risk assets, such as equities, made further gains; indeed, equities reached a further interim high during September. The trend in the past few months has been that peripheral bond markets in the eurozone do well when risk assets in general are doing well. This pattern was repeated in the past month with strong price gains in markets such as Italy and Ireland although, towards the end of the month, there was some slowing in the pace of gains in these peripheral markets versus the more subdued markets like France and Germany. These core markets posted modest gains in September, a picture mirrored in the US bond market. Economic data during the period was mixed. While central banks were keen to expound on their exit strategies from emergency policy settings, at the same time they emphasised

that rates would not be increased prematurely. The net effect of this was that investors lowered future rate expectations by around 0.2% in both the US and eurozone. Inflation data continued to be relatively muted (similarly for inflation expectations) which eases some of the concerns of policymakers when set against a rising gold price, which gained another 6% over the period. The Merrill Lynch over 5 year Eurozone Government Bond Index gained a further 0.7% in September, bringing the year-to-date performance to just under 4.4%.

Spotlight on Stocks

The following stocks are included (at time of going to print) in the Eagle Star funds, including the 5★5 Global Fund.

Healthcare, Personal Care & Leisure Sector Sanofi-Aventis

Sanofi-Aventis is one of the largest global research-driven pharmaceutical companies. It was created by the 2004 merger of Sanofi-Synthélabo and Aventis. The company has leading products in the field of cancer, thrombosis, cardiovascular disease and diabetes. It also has a strong vaccines business. The company has introduced new management with the stated goals of streamlining the groups businesses, reducing overhead costs, focusing on emerging markets and driving new growth opportunities. Sanofi-Aventis trades at a discount to its pharmaceutical peers.

Resources and Infrastructure Sector Rio Tinto

Rio Tinto is one of the world's largest mining companies with significant interests in copper, iron-ore, aluminium and coal. A key player in global merger & acquisition activity in the mining sector over the past decade, Rio Tinto's diverse range of assets provides a significant degree of earnings stability. The company has a meaningful proportion of sales to China and has profited accordingly. Rises in commodity prices and volumes have had a great impact on the company's profitability.

Information and Communication Technology Sector Cisco Systems

Cisco Systems is one of the largest technology companies in the world. It makes telecom and networking equipment. The company is benefiting from continued strong growth in internet traffic as this increases demand for its routers and switches. The company has initiated big restructuring actions

and this should enable it to weather the tough IT spending environment. The company's balance sheet is very strong and acquisitions could be a catalyst for the stock. The valuation of the stocks is attractive, especially on free cash flow metrics, and its P/E multiple should expand once revenue growth starts accelerating, and once margins return to their historical level.

Finance Sector

Goldman Sachs

Goldman Sachs is a global investment banking, trading, and asset management company, with leading market shares across its businesses. Management is very highly regarded given their track record through the credit crisis, and its capital base is very strong. The company has gained market shares over the last year as competitors have pulled back from the fixed interest and other businesses. Goldman Sachs should benefit from the pick up in high margin and return M&A work which is occurring given their strong franchise in advisory. The valuation is attractive on a P/E basis and book value growth should be in the double digits over the next year.

Consumer Sector

British American Tobacco (BAT)

BAT is a global tobacco company, with more than half of its profits coming from emerging markets. It has an excellent brand mix, with strong pricing in many markets. It is also centralising management, marketing and production thereby cutting costs with cost savings being reinvested in brand and packaging innovations. BAT has exhibited very good pricing power even in recessionary times. BAT has a very strong balance sheet and a sustainable progressive dividend policy.

Global Outlook

- Economic data has improved with the IMF now anticipating positive growth of 3.1% in 2010, after an expected fall of 1.1% this year. The strains within the financial system have eased considerably, although bank lending is still impaired; partly for this reason, policymakers remain slightly cautious on the economic outlook. Trade tensions are not yet a major issue but, as with the recent spat between the US and China, they are worth watching for any economic or market impact.
- Analysts attribute much of the economic improvement to the scale and scope of policy initiatives to rescue the banking system and offset the
 collapse in private sector demand. The ultimate success of these efforts (or their unintended consequences) remains uncertain, given the size of
 the global crisis that they are seeking to redress.
- Short rates continue to hover between 0% and 1% in the major economies, with central banks continuing to pursue a nuanced policy. They want to keep rates sufficiently low to foster recovery but also want to exit from emergency policy settings as quickly as conditions permit. The recent rate increase in Australia has made investors slightly more nervous, but "lower-for-longer" is still the dominant theme among investors in the US, UK and eurozone.
- Inflation is still generally supportive to bond markets, which have also benefited from the same positive liquidity backdrop that has helped other assets. The "elephant in the room" remains the exit from emergency policy settings, which is bound to have some impact on bond markets, just as the Fed's "dry-run" of liquidity withdrawal did last week. In the eurozone, peripheral bond markets have seen their spreads over Germany narrow aggressively helped by a generally-supportive backdrop for risk.
- Global equity markets had another small correction from the recent high but have regained that loss again, in what historically can be a tricky seasonal spell for equity markets. Valuations are rich rather than cheap at this stage, but markets have continued to grind out recoveries from any dips. The balance of overall sentiment has turned slightly positive again, as investors begin to digest Q3 earnings.
